TERRITORIAL COVERS

USED IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON

<u>Purpose:</u> This presentation shows covers used during the territorial period from Oregon and Washington. Where it can be determined, the routes that the cover traveled will be examined. The Oregon Territory was created on August 14, 1847, and it included what would become the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, as well as parts of Montana and Wyoming. Washington Territory was created on March 2, 1853 and included parts of Idaho and Montana. The first post offices were at Astoria and Oregon City and were authorized by the United States Government in 1847. When the territory of Washington was created 14 post offices were move into the Washington territory.

Scope: This exhibit is arranged in chronological order by the opening date of the post offices. The current county location is shown in parenthesis. Several post offices, are exhibited that were established prior to the formation of the Washington Territory in 1853. It is not always possible to represent these post offices with pre–1853 covers.

Towns formed in Oregon Territory, and became part of Washington Territory in 1853.
